









POPULATION

1940-2010






PERCENT CHANGE FROM PREVIOUS YEAR IN LOWER EASTWICK CENSUS TRACTS AND PHILADELPHIA





PERCENT OF TOTAL POPULATION WITHIN LOWER EASTWICK CENSUS TRACTS







PERCENT OF TOTAL POPULATION WITHIN LOWER EASTWICK CENSUS TRACTS






PERCENT OF OCCUPIED HOUSING UNITS WITHIN LOWER EASTWICK CENSUS TRACTS



HISTORIC WETLAND:

Tinicum Marsh is a freshwater tidal marsh within the Delaware Estuary - the largest remaining in Pennsylvania - that once spanned 5,700 acres.

Beginning in the 1600's, early settlers diked and drained parts of the marsh for grazing.




HISTORIC EXTENT OF MARSH






HISTORIC EXTENT OF MARSH

Area of marshlands compared to 1900










500 YEAR FLOOD


SEA LEVEL RISE:

Sea level rise may have detrimental impacts to the aquifer, leading to consequences such as degration of potable water quality, high water tables and flooding, and intrusion of saltwater and contaminants into streams and rivers.

Multiple sources of flooding affect the Study Area. Seasonal snow melt and heavy rains result in overflows along Cobbs Creek and the Schuylkill River.

The site is also vulnerable to storm surges from the Delaware River, as well as the Tinicum Marsh, which has reduced tidal capacity due to dams and impounding.


